New phone number to report police matters

Not all matters reported to police are urgent and as such attendances are prioritised to ensure that urgent matters are quickly attended.

For urgent matters ring 000 and that will get you urgent attention.

For other minor matters there is now another phone number to ring - that is 131444 and it is known as policelink.

Police Commissioner Bob Atkinson said the \$54 million Policelink service will operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week. This new service will operate from a new call centre at the Emergency Services Centre at Zillmere in Brisbane's northside.

The Queensland Police Service receives approximately 450,000 triple-0 calls a year, but only around four per cent of these relate to a time critical or life threatening incident.

This service is expected to help reduce pressure on police at the coalface attending to urgent matters.

The introduction of this number brings Queensland into line with other Australian states.

Climber falls for Australia

An American tourist who has been in Australia for only four days "fell for Australia" in a big way on Sunday August 8th, 2010 when he slid approximately 40 meters down a steep section of Mount Beerwah in the Sunshine Coast Hinterland.

He had to be treated and winched off by the AGL helicopter crew and other emergency service personnel.

The climber suffered a compound fracture of his thigh and was airlifted to Royal Brisbane Hospital where he was admitted in a stable condition.

The walking track on Mt. Beerwah has been closed for over 18 months by the Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service because the track has been rated as dangerous.

The track is barricaded off and walkers have to walk around a physical barrier on the track and go past four "closed" signs to access the track.

Mount Beerwah is described as a difficult climb and much more difficult to descend.

The injured walker, aged 22 was one of a group of five people who were located in the prohibited area.

The remaining people in the group were assisted back down the mountain by SES volunteers.

A Queensland Fire and Rescue

spokesperson who attended the scene said, "The reason the mountain is closed is because it's dangerous. We have to go in and rescue hikers who don't care about their own safety. It's just stupidity."

An Emergency services spokesperson said that it is believed that it was the actions of an inexperienced walker that led him to fall from a 120 metre height, and not an instability in the climb.

The spokesperson continued, "The man could have lost his life. He is extremely lucky to be alive."

There is a \$350 fine for disregarding the signs. Police are investigating if any offences were committed in this instance and charges could follow.

Female motorcyclist injured at Green Park

A 36 year old female motorcyclist was injured at Green Park, Conondale on Saturday July 31st, 2010 at about 4.30p.m.

The woman who competing in an organised motorcross event at the time suffered a dislocated shoulder.

She was airlifted to Royal Brisbane Hospital in a stable condition by the AGL Action Rescue Helicopter.

Woodford Festival site hosts another successful event

Another successful festival has been hosted by the people who organise the Woodford Folk Festival and The Dreaming Festival.

More than 32,000 people attended the three-day festival which featured nearly 100 bands.

The Splendour in the Grass festival has been held in Coffs Harbour for the previous 10 years but this is the first time it had been held in Queensland.

At this time the festival organisers are not able to advise if the festival will continue at this site, but largest festival at Byron attracted 17,000 whilst this festival attracted over 30000.

Each festival supports local businesses in the area.

Recently stories in major newspapers have bemoaned the fact that major milk producers are taking advantage of local farmers by continuing to lower the price that they offer on the purchase of raw milk.

It has been suggested that the price offered to farmers for their milk dropped from 56.23c to 49.19c a litre and a large volume is bought for as little as 30c a litre.

Long-time local dairy farmers advise that the cost of production to them of milk is calculated to cost at least 50 to 55 cents per litre.

Because of this price discrepancy it is expected that more farmers will leave their farms. This is on top of the numbers that left after the deregulation of the dairy industry about 10 years ago.

This is another instance of Australian companies being bought out by foreign companies in an effort to make a quick profit.

The 3 major players in the Australian milk market are Pura and Dairy Farmers who are owned by Japanese companies and Pauls which is owned by an Italy company.

This is a great opportunity to really support another local business, Maleny Dairies.

Maleny Dairies is a third generation Maleny family owned business situated in McCarthy's Road, Maleny.

With the advent of milk industry deregulation the Hopper family realised that they could not survive resultant drastic drop in income, so they decided to fight back by building a milk processing plant in Maleny.

This not only helped themselves, but the other local farmers who supply raw milk to Maleny Dairies for processing.

Maleny Milk is readily available at Maleny shops. By purchasing Maleny Dairy products you are helping to provide local jobs for local friends and relatives.

Not only that you are helping the environment as the dairy products are not transported over vast distances to get from the farm onto our tables.

Mum's favourite Recipes

Stir fried roast duck with snow peas and noodles

- A great favourite!



Ingredients

- * vegetable oil * 1 tbsp finely chopped ginger * 1/4 cup water
- * 1 clove garlic * 2 cups trimmed snow peas * 4 sliced green onions
- * 1 boned and sliced Chinese roast duck * 2 tbsp light soy sauce
- * 2 tbsp oyster sauce * 1 very finely sliced lebanese cucumber

Heat 2 tbsp vegetable oil in a wok over high heat and add 1 tbsp finely chopped ginger and 1 clove garlic, finely chopped, and stir-fry for 30 seconds.

Add 4 sliced green onions and 2 cups trimmed snow peas and stir-fry for 1 minute. Add 1 boned and sliced Chinese roast duck and stir-fry another minute, then add 1/4 cup water, 2 tbsp light soy sauce, 2 tbsp oyster sauce and bring to the boil and stir-fry for a further minute or until duck is heated through.


It matters little what the monetary penalty is or how much education is given there are some drivers who just will not take notice of the road rules.

Do you know somebody who has been reported as a missing person?

Do you realise that each year an average of 4700 are people reported missing.

In Queensland the Police Service's recovery rate is 99.5%. But, there are still approximately 260 people on the long term missing persons register (dating back to 1970).

Not every person who goes missing does so under suspicious circumstances.

There are some people who go missing for a number of personal reasons and they do not want to be located.

If a person has been reported missing and does not wish to be located, it is important they make contact with police. Once police have verified that a person is safe and well their whereabouts remains confidential but they are taken off the police missing person's list.

Each year Australian police services have a week dedicated especially to highlighting the need for missing people to contact relatives.

This year the theme of that week is "When someone goes missing a day spent waiting is a day lost", aiming to dispel the myth that you need to wait 24 hours before reporting a loved one or friend missing.

Detective Senior Sergeant Damien Powell, Officer in Charge of the State Crime Operations Command Missing Persons Unit believes information from the public is crucial to any missing persons investigation.

Anyone with information about a person they believe may be a missing person should contact Crime Stoppers anonymously via 1800 333 000 or crimestoppers.com.au 24hrs a day.

Local politician returns home!

State MP Andrew Powell, member for the Glasshouse electorate is finally returning home to his proper electorate after spending the last 18 months headquartered in Caboolture. The shift should be finalised before the end of September 2010.

The seat of Glasshouse underwent boundary changes after the last election. The electoral boundaries now covers an area from Conondale and Flaxton in the north, to Mt Mee and Bellmere in the south. The new electorate office is now situated at 70 Maple Street, Maleny which is not only centrally located in the electorate, but is the largest CBD.

"It has been a little strange being the Member for Glass House and operating from an office in Caboolture, outside of the electorate," Mr Powell said.

Mr Powell continued, "Being centrally located in Maleny will mean less driving time for me and my staff – a win for the electorate.

Less time on the road means more time delivering outcomes for the electorate."

Mr Powell also said that he is committed to holding mobile offices throughout the electorate every couple of months and if an elector is not able to attend those or get to the new office then he undertakes to visit the elector.

Another service offered through the electorate office, with a couple of days prior notice for community groups will be the availability of photocopying facilities.

Rainwater tanks now need a building permit!

For some time now the Governments and local authorities have attempted to prevail upon people that it to help the environment by installing rainwater tanks to supply water to toilets and cold water laundry use to reduce our reliance on water storages.

People in the Sunshine Coast Council area who install a water tank, now officially known as a "water-bank" with a capacity of 3000 litres or over has to obtain building permit before installation.

Before commencing you must obtain a compliance approval (approval of plans) for the proposed work. This is obtained by completing Forms 1 + 2 and submitting them to the local authority.

The installation then has to be inspected by a "qualified plumber" when completed.

The Council will then issue a compliance certificate when the regulated work has been satisfactorily completed.

An annual fee for testing this system and council registration may be incurred.

Is this the first step towards placing a fee on rain water captured in that system.

All of this is on top of the heavily increased bureaucracy brought into being with the formation of Unity Water, the newly-established group that is now in charge of water services, taking over from the Sunshine Coast and Moreton Bay regional councils.

This body was forced upon the councils by the Queensland Government when provision

of residential water was privatised.

There are also a number of other new bodies involved in the water bureaucracy;

Seqwater – catches, stores and treats water by managing catchments, storages and water treatment plants.

WaterSecure – supplies desalinated water to the water grid and supplies purified recycled water to power stations and other customers

LinkWater – manages, operates and maintains SEQ's potable bulk water pipelines and moves water from dams and other sources through bulk pipeline networks.

SEQ Water Grid Manager – operates the water grid and oversees the flow of water.

Since these bodies were set up about 10 per cent of residents have questioned the bills, with many recording an unusually high rate of water consumption.

It has not only been Sunshine Coast residents who have been charged massive increases in

the cost of water. Residents in the Brisbane, Ipswich, Lockyer Valley, Scenic Rim and Somerset council areas have also had price rises of an average of 10.7 per cent.

Water from Sunshine Coast water facilities is being taken south to other S.E.Q areas, but there are no facilities to bring water back should there be an incident involving disruption of water supply to the Sunshine Coast.

It can well be said that we have short memories and it was only a couple of years ago that S.E.Q. was in the grip of a severe drought and any government would have been expected to take reasonable steps to ensure safety of supply of water for Queenslanders.

For years prior to this there was very little action taken to plan for this eventuality.

People need to learn not to waste precious water, even now when we have plenty.

More needs to be done now to ensure water security, but increasing bureaucracy, regulations and spending money with such gay abandon is not the answer.

Privatisation has been tried in a number of places around the world and it is hard to find any place where it has worked in favour of the consumer. In fact in many of those locations calls have been made for governments to intervene.

Privatisation is not the answer - it is sucking people's ability to survive within our society with a reasonable standard of living.

Council Rates here now!

Rates notices will arrive in letterboxes for 153,000 Sunshine Coast properties over the next few days, as council today started mailing out its first rate run of the 2010/11 financial year with a value of \$136 million including the state government fire levy.

Finance and Business Executive Director Greg Laverty said all rate payers should try to take advantage of the offered five per cent discount off general rates.

"If rates are paid by August 20th, for eligible pensioners there is no maximum limit on this discount but it is capped to a maximum of \$100 for non-pensioners," Greg Laverty said.

Reduce, reuse and recycle tips

A craft project made easy

Painting with an Aerosol Can

To remove a child proof cap insert a screwdriver in the cap and lever it up. The horizontal setting is used when spraying up and down. Press button until only gas escapes.

To clean the nozzle after use and prevent blocking turn the can upside down and press button until only gas escapes.

Project Check List for Aerosol Painting;

1. Clean the surface you are about to paint with a suitable cleaner eg; Sugar Soap, turps etc
2. Have lots of rags handy for any cleaning.
3. Drop Sheet to protect from any over spray, overspray can travel long distances so make sure you cover a wide area.
4. Masking Material eg; tape, newspaper, cardboard to ensure the paint goes on the areas you want it too and also to protect surrounding areas from paint.
5. Sand paper to prepare the

surface, try using a dust mask to protect yourself from the dust.

6. Have available turps or Rust Guard Solvent for clean up.

7. Wearing gloves will protect your hands from paint.
