Bilbies in the Park

Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve Education Centre will hosting some special friends on Saturday July 19th from 9.30am.

Frank 'the bilby man' Manthey will be bringing some of his precious marsupials to visit Maleny. The bilby is a marsupial mammal which belongs to the bandicoot family and is about the size of a rabbit.

Unfortunately it is in the list of Queensland's 12 most endangered mammals. Frank said, "It's hard to believe there are only around 600 of these Australian marsupials left in the wild." Currawinya National Park is the essence of central Australia and it is here that a sanctury has been set up for the bilby.

Will the Sunshine Coast be left high and dry?

The Infrastructure minister Paul Lucas said, "The good rain we've had this year on the Sunshine Coast means stage one of the pipeline will be able to supply the water we need through until 2011 and so the state government has delayed building part of its water grid, instead planning to siphon 65 million litres of water a day from Baroon Pocket Dam until late 2011."

Because of the rainfalls that we have had since November 2007 Baroon Pocket Dam has remained about 80% full. Baroon Pocket Dam was constructed in 1988 by the Caloundra and Maroochy Water Boards and holds some 60 000 ML of water. Its primary use has been for town water supply for Maroochy & Caloundra but now is expected to boost supplies for other parts of South East Queensland.

In the scheme of things 60,000 ML of water is not a big body of water. There is also some doubt weather the recent good rain falls will continue into the medium future. Sunshine Coast mayor Bob Abbot said that he was concerned that taking water from Baroon Pocket could threaten the region's water security.

The Queensland Water Commission has stated that their modelling shows Sunshine Coast dams could be allowed to go as low as 20% while continuing to supply Brisbane. Residents of the Sunshine Coast could be put on permanent water restrictions once the new pipeline to supply Brisbane residents is connected.

With the next election near could itg be that Premier Anna Bligh and Labor Party members now are concerned about the electoral backlash over the building of the Traveston Dam and so are considering announcing that it will not be built.

Latest figures show the Sunshine Coast's population grew from Sunshine Coast 247,200 in 2001 to 303,050 last year. In the year to June 2007, Caloundra's population grew by 2892, to 96,140. Maroochydore's grew 4574 to 157,238 and Noosa's population grew 0.9%, or by 459 people, to 49,672.

All of these new people will require water thus putting more pressure on Baroon Pocket Dam. This all goes to show that the big decisions about water, land use, and infrastructure planning should be made in conjunction with regional councils and in an open environment to ensure that the best possible advice is being acted upon.

Sheen Stripping - for that sophisticated look

Sheen striping Sheen striping is a technique that involves painting vertical stripes of the same color, but differing sheens, for a subtle, sophisticated look. It is often used in dining rooms, above the chair rail, or in areas that need some visual "height" due to a low ceiling.

For this technique, you might choose a low sheen and a flat product, which will create visual interest without being overwhelming. The sheen difference should be somewhat subtle, so a flat and a high gloss may not be the best combination. In terms of color choice, let your personal preference be your guide. If you need some direction, though, here is some advice:

- For dining rooms, red is often the color of choice. Red stimulates the appetite which is why you see it on so many restaurant walls. Green is also a good color for this room, as green is the color of many foods.
- Hallways and foyers can benefit from the a "welcoming" color, like yellow, or a shade of orange, like peach or terra-cotta.
- Bedrooms can become serene havens or romantic escapes by using colors like pale blue, green, or lavender.

Materials required

- 1. Painter's tape. Enough to stripe the entire room or object. Be sure to use painter's tape (something like 3M's Blue Tape) which will not stick as much and be less likely to pull up the flat base coast when removed.
- 2. Level and/or ruler
- 3. Quality interior acrylic flat paint

- 4. Quality acrylic interior semi-gloss paint (same hue or color as the flat paint)
- 5. Rollers, paint brushes, drop cloths, paint roller trays, stir sticks, trash bags

Directions

- 1. Make sure the wall surface or object you will paint is clean and sound.
- 2. Paint the wall(s) with quality acrylic interior flat or low sheen paint first. Let dry completely overnight or longer.
- 3. Using painter's tape and a level, mark off the area to be painted with SG paint--typically in a vertical pattern. The usual width for each stripe is 400ml to 800ml. The larger the space, the wider the stripe should be. It might help to have a second person help with the taping. Each "flat" and semi-gloss stripe should be the same width. Use the level to insure your lines are perfectly vertical.
- 4. Paint the area to be "striped" with quality semi-gloss paint same color as the flat paint. Let dry 2 to 3 hours, then carefully remove the painters tape. Have a trash can or bag handy to toss the painter's tape in.
- 5. Enjoy this beautiful decorative technique!

Yet we can kill 26 people in Queensland in a couple of weeks and next to nothing is said. To make it worse most, if not all of those deaths could have easily been avoided by somebody being responsible for themselves and taking some care when driving.

Deputy Premier Paul Lucas called on drivers to remember their families. "Everybody thinks that a road accident statistic is someone you read about in the paper that you don't know," he said in Brisbane.

It is just too easy to blame road conditions, weather conditions or Donald Duck. Too often it is lack of thought by ourselves.



Ingredients

- * 2 medium, firm but ripe mangoes * 2 ripe avocados
- * Squeeze of lemon juice * 300-350g smoked chicken breasts * 200g mixed salad leaves, such as rocket, mache, baby chard or amaranth * 2 tbsp pine nuts, toasted (optional)

Dressing

- * 2 tbsp orange juice * 2 tbsp lemon juice
- * 1 tbsp wholegrain mustard * 2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- * 2 tbsp avocado oil (or olive oil)
- * Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method

Peel the mangoes and cut the flesh away from the stone into thin slices. Arrange on four serving plates.

Halve the avocados and remove the stone. Peel off the skin and slice the flesh into strips. Squeeze over a little lemon juice to stop the avocado flesh discolouring, then arrange over the mango slices.

Cut the chicken into thin slices and divide between the plates. Neatly pile the salad leaves in the middle of each plate. For the dressing Whisk the ingredients together in a bowl, seasoning with salt and pepper to taste. Spoon the dressing over the salad and serve, topped with a handful of toasted pine nuts.

WHY IS IT SO?

Whip Cracking

Fred lives out of town, and he asked, "Why does a whip crack?"

Well, there's a few answers to this.

It's claimed that the whip crack is actually a sonic boom. This sonic boom is supposed to appear when the very tip of the whip moves at faster than the speed of sound, and so breaks the sound barrier.

The speed of sound is pretty close to around to 1,000 kilometres per hour, so how can you move the tip of a whip at that speed (besides the fact that you've got a long lever arm)?

One theory is based on the fact that the whip is tapered from the handle to the tip. When you move the whip handle, you start a wave heading towards the tip. The wave has a certain amount of energy. This energy depends upon the speed of the wave, and the mass of the whip that it is moving in each instant. As the wave gradually moves down into the narrow region, it's moving less mass. So to conserve energy, the wave has to go faster. This is one claim as to how it can build up enough speed to break the sound barrier.

The other theory has nothing to do with the whip being tapered. It says that when the wave goes down to the tip of the whip, it then gets reflected back to the handle. When it changes direction from "going out" to "coming back," it has to go through a very brief, but very enormous, acceleration For that brief instant it goes super sonic and that's why you get the whip crack.

But one thing still worries me. I was unable to find any definite evidence (such as high-speed photography) showing that the tip is moving faster than the speed of sound.

Maybe the crack is just the sound of the tip folding back, and slapping another part of the whip.


