

## Hinterland bus service -use it or lose it!

Maroochy and Caloundra Councils joined with the State Transport Department in a \$116,000 project to trial a hinterland public bus service between Maleny and Nambour.

This service is due for review at the end of June 2008. Whilst the new Sunshine Coast Regional Council is in favour of keeping this service continuing it is really up to the hinterland residents to keep it going. It is really a case of "use it or lose it". The service must be viable and be shown to be a useful service to the hinterland area.

The new Sunshine Coast Regional Council has agreed to lobby the State Transport Department and to lobby the Minister to have the service continued after the end of the trial period. Division five Councillor, Jenny McKay said, "It is disappointing to see that the state government has not continued with financial support to continue the service after this trial period expires."

## The "NUT" Award


It matters little what the monetary penalty is or how much education is given there are some drivers who just will not take notice of the road rules.

## Mum's favourite Recipes

### Three Cheese Risotto

- easy evening meal on these warm afternoons.

#### Ingredients

\* 2 tablespoons butter \* 1 onion, finely chopped \* 1 clove garlic, crushed \* 2 cups Arborio rice \* 2 litres hot chicken or vegetable stock  
50g Australian Blue, crumbled \* 50g Australian Cheddar, grated \* 50g Australian Romano or Parmesan, grated \* 1/4 cup finely chopped fresh herbs (chives and parsley) \* extra Australian Romano or Parmesan, shaved.

#### Method

1. In a large saucepan, melt the butter and saute the onion and garlic until soft. Add rice and stir, for 1 minute, or until the rice is opaque in colour.
2. Ladle in 1 cup of hot stock, simmer, stirring constantly until liquid has been absorbed. Continue to add 1 cup of hot stock at a time until all the liquid has been absorbed and rice is tender. This will take about 20 minutes.
3. Stir in Blue, Cheddar, Romano and herbs into risotto. Serve in bowls topped with extra shaved Romano Cheese.

*Handy Hints - Turn this risotto into a dinner party classic by serving mounds of risotto topped with pan-fried chicken or duck and a buttery red wine jus.*

## Murphy's law in Irian Jaya

In 1990, I was asked to organise the alluvial banka drilling on a project in south east Irian Jaya, now known as West Papua, Indonesia. The Dutch had panned gold traces on the Eilanden in 1905 and the gold fever for this never before explored area was high, on the premise that as there was gold at Tembagapura (the Freeport copper mine) west of us as well as at Ok Tedi and Porgera in PNG, there must be other primary gold deposits. And that being the case, there must be alluvials, as the rivers flowed south, even though a massive earthquake in 1980 caused major river pattern changes.

By June, I had all the equipment sourced and crated in a warehouse in Jakarta ready for shipment, so flew back to Sydney to await its arrival on site. Every week (in Sydney) a fax arrived telling me to hold tight, the barge was delayed again. The equipment went by cargo boat from Jakarta to Sorong (Irian Jaya), then was to go to the site by powered barge.

Finally on September 19, I flew to Jayapura, the capital of Irian Jaya, then on to Wamena, where we waited and waited, and finally down to Senggo on the Becking river, in the heart of the Asmat territory and the largest malarial swamp in the world.

The barge captain claimed his contract was to go only to Senggo, and not our camp on the Eilanden, so he moored at the mouth of the Becking. Senggo to our camp site was 17 minutes by chopper, but 150kms or 7 hours by boat. Now

that we had located the elusive barge, the stories began to unfold about its 22 day voyage from Sorong, a distance of 1,400kms which normally would take six days. 1: Short of water, so it pulled into Fak Fak. 2: Captain and crew not paid, so waited in Fak Fak. 3: Radio not working, so stayed in Fak Fak.

We hired longboats in Agats to transport our gear upriver, and MAF (Missionary Air Fellowship) agreed to help with their Hughes 500, which used 100 litres of kerosene per hour, or a drum every two.

Our original budget for the project was \$500,000, but with this new development it was revised double. It well surpassed that in the end.

The actual saga of the barge:

August 28 ETD Sorong.  
Sept. 10 Actual departure.  
Sept 11 Arrive Sege. Heavy seas.  
Standby 9 days.  
Sept 20 - Depart Sege .  
Sept 22 - Arrive Fak Fak.  
(Radio broken. Standby 6 days.)  
Sept 29 Depart Fak Fak.  
Oct 1 Arrive and depart Agats.  
Oct 2 All day stuck on sand bar.  
Oct 3 Arrive Karabis.  
Oct 4 Off load and depart.

During this voyage, the crews consumed 100kg of rice, 50kg of sugar, 1 box of Super Mie (noodles), 50 cartons of cigarettes, 2 drums of diesel, 1 drum petrol, etc, etc.

So the three longboats loaded up and took gear upstream, plus the chopper (350kg/trip) and the float plane (300kg). The chopper price was \$ 750/hour minus Avtur (kerosene), so we had brought

that he witnessed during his journeys into third world countries.

30+ drums on the barge – the float plane used its own Avgas. However, having to use the chopper plus the longboats (one drum of kerosene per round trip), used up most of our stock before we even started drilling. The barge had sailed from Sorong with 40 drums of avtur (estimated to last the entire project, fuel for the choppers and outboards), 60 drums of gasoline (for outboards, pumps, generators, chain saws etc), six drums of diesel (for the drills) and three drums of oil.

38 drums of avtur arrived at Karabis - 35 drums were used to mobilise to the base camp - 3 were left for the project!

On October 15, we spudded in the first hole of the project. Thus it was five months since I went to Jakarta to organise these drills. The project folded in November, with the final result being 12 mg/m<sup>3</sup> of gold for the entire operation.

Back in Australia, on January 10, 1991, I went down with Vivax Malaria (luckily not the deadly Falciparim). I had failed to continue taking my pills for two months after leaving the project...
