Queensland, in fact Australia has just been hit by the most costly natural disaster sionce foundation with all the eastern mainland states sustaining major flood damage.

Southern states are still covered by floods.

That is only the beginning as the recovery has hardly started. And it will continue for years.

Already Queensland Premier, Ms Anna Bligh has announced a multi- million dollar commission of inquiry headed by Queensland Court of Appeal Judge Catherine Holmes to look into the disaster, government preparedness and the emergency response.

This inquiry is expected to take over a year to complete. As with any major incident it is appropriate and necessary to hold a "de-briefing" not only to ensure that proper procedures were followed, but that they are appropriate or could they be improved.

De-briefings should not be a blame game procedure, but a mechanism meant to ensure that the best possible proceedures are in place.

To ensure the Inquiry is not just a coverup, but gets to the bottom of every issue the Term of Reference should include any matters that the Commission deems appropriate – not just those matters stipulated by the Government. To do anything less does not really give Queenslanders any sence of reassurance and confidence for the future.

We must not get lulled back into any sence of "it won't happen again", because it just might happen again next year and we should be properly prepared.

This would also be a good opportunity to look at the requirements necessary for development of flood plain areas such as the Caloundra South development.

In light of the past month's activities and the vulnerability of home owners and insurance companies some definite policies have to be put in place before any more flood prone land is developed.

The inquiry team is expected to visit towns and cities inundated by the floods, allowing local people to hearings and give evidence. It is expected to be finalised by the end of January 2012.

In terms of living in Queensland this inquiry has a lot riding on it and the people of Queensland should not be short changed in regards to the openness of the inquiry.

Not only the future of our State riding on it, but that of each of us as individuals.

A LETTER FROM LIVINGSTONE

Those of you who followed the World Cup from South Africa will be aware that southern Africa can be very cold, especially at night. Despite being some 1500 km north of Johannesburg the city of Livingstone in Zambia is still very cold around the middle of the year.

It is not unusual therefore to see groups of people huddled around fires in rags trying to keep warm.

Unfortunately many of these poor souls are children.

One cold morning in Livingstone, nine years ago, a diminutive Sri-Lankan lady noticed a dirty blanket at the side of the street. Suddenly

the blanket moved and out came a boy! Evidently he had slept the night under there, he was one of Livingstone's many street children.

After stretching the boy headed for a waste bin and began foraging in it for his breakfast. Since the



Ebenezer School in 1995 rolls, she was able to offer the boy

some of them, which she expected him to wolf down.

Not so, he whistled loudly and, as from nowhere, a whole mob of kids came running. Making sure

that each got their fair-share, the boy distributed the bread he had been given. That boys name was Morgan and he is still involved with the Friends of Ebenezer in Livingstone.

Seeing this the Sri-Lankan lady gave him the rest of the bread rolls, her own family would have to manage without since it was Sunday and the shops had just closed.



Just a simple act of kindness? Yes but a kindness that has changed the lives of hundreds of people in Livingstone and around the world.

Over the coming weeks I hope to share with you the story of how God has used this tiny grand-mother to give new hope to children in Livingstone (the city named after the famous Scottish missionary).

Almost 20 years ago my husband Richard and myself went to live and work in Gaborone the capitol of Botswana. Some of you may have heard of Gaborone, it is the home of Mma Romotswe the main character of the First Lady's Detective Agency stories - a series of eleven novels by Scottish author Alexander McCall Smith.

Mum's favourite Recipes

Macadamia Crusted Chicken

- just another great chicken recipe we always had a lot of chicken because we bred them.

Ingredients

- * 100g macadamia nuts * 1 cup fresh breadcrumbs * 2 eggs
- * 1/2 cup plain flour * 4 chicken-breast minute steaks * 2 tbsp olive oil

Directions

Place macadamia nuts in the bowl of a food processor and use the pulse button to crush. Transfer to a bowl. Add breadcrumbs. Season.

Place flour on a plate. Lightly whisk eggs in a bowl. Dip chicken into flour.

Shake off excess. Dip in egg, then in the macadamia mixture, pressing firmly to coat the meat. Heat olive oil in a large frypan over medium heat.

Cook chicken for about 3 minutes each side or until golden and cooked through. Serve with vegetables.

One such youth organisation, known as the Australian Sea Cadet Corp was formed in 1910 and was jointly administered by the Navy League of Australia and the Royal Australian Navy.

In 1973 this group had a name change to The Australian Navy Cadets and they have been part of the Navy family ever since.

In 1997 the Naval Cadet Unit TS Centaur was formed to the opportunity for the youth of Maleny & surrounds to acquire skills in leadership and teamwork by participating in sailing, power boating, bushwalking, rifle shooting, drum band, parade activities, seamanship, organised camps with other Units and many other activities.

The Australian Navy Cadets is a voluntary youth organisation, open to young males and females between 12 1/2 & 19 years of age and is sponsored by the Royal Australian Navy.

There are some 82 Units across

Australia each with between 20 and 80 Cadets. TS Centaur is part of the Sunshine Coast Flotilla, consisting of 4 Units.

An emergency service spokesperson said, "The pylons of the bridge have apparently become weakened as a result of the recent floods."



Another paint hint from Maleny Paint Place

Painting those tricky doors

Doors are one of the most difficult painted surfaces in your home to keep clean. Dirty handprints from the kids and scuffs at the bottom of the door from shoes are just a few of the things that you will be battling in an effort to keep it clean. If the door is paneled, you have the additional challenge of trying to keep dust and grime from settling into the grooves on the door. Occasionally, you may find that cleaning just isn't enough and that you need to paint the door in order to keep it looking fresh.

Painting a paneled door can be a bit tricky. It's not like a flat door where you can just get a roller and paint the entire surface of the door in a few minutes. It is impossible to get the roller into all of the panel corners and angled surfaces. With a few simple steps and a little bit of patience though, you can have your paneled door looking like new with a fresh coat of paint.

Preparing the Door

The first step in any painting project is to prepare the surface to accept the paint. If you don't do this, then you may end up with peeling or flaking paint in the near future. Use a standard household cleaner to make sure that all of the surface dirt and grease is removed from every surface that you are going to paint. Once you are confident that the door is clean, use a piece of 150 grit sandpaper to lightly scuff all of the

flat surfaces. This will help the new paint to stick better.

If you have any paint that is peeling, then you need to use a putty knife to scrape it away before you sand. You can use the sand paper to smooth any rough edges that may be left after scraping. Although this step generally isn't needed on interior doors, you may find that some scraping is necessary on paneled doors that have a surface exposed to the weather.

Painting

When painting a paneled door, you will definitely need a high quality brush. Some folks also like to use a small roller for the flat surfaces, but you can do the entire door with a brush and still get a quality finish. When selecting the paint, make sure that you get a gloss sheen. Not only is this paint much easier to keep clean than lowsheen or a flat, it is quite a bit more durable.

Begin with the panels. Using your brush, paint the corners and the grooves of the panels in much the same way that you would if you were cutting in the corners of a wall that you were about to paint. Make sure that you don't get too much paint, as it will gather in the milled grooves and distort the appearance of the door. It is much better to use a light coat and then apply a second if necessary than it is to put on too much paint at the beginning.

After you have cut in the cor-

ners of all the panels you can brush over the flat surface of the panels. This is an area where some people like to use their small roller. Just use the roller to apply the paint, and then use the brush to make sure that it is spread evenly. This is the best way to avoid the stippled roller texture that will be left on the smooth surface of the door.

The last portion of the door that you should paint is the stiles and rails. These are the flat surfaces that actually hold the panels into place. With these, as with the flat face of the panels, you can use a roller to apply the pain and then finish the texture with your brush, or you can paint them entirely by hand with the brush. Work slowly around the corners and edges of the panels to make sure that you don't cause any drips that will flow down into the panels and cause runs.

Painting a paneled door does not require a lot of skill, it just takes a little bit of patience
